- 2.) Explore the possibility of expanding the criminal investigative division to help with increasing serious felonious case load.

Officer Michael Burns,

On Saturday, June 15, 2013, Officer Michael Burns responded to 1153 Woodsboro Farms for the report of an 87 year old female not breathing. Having arrived on the scene at the same time as fire and emergency medical personnel, Off. Burns, without hesitation, began to administer Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation.

Off. Burns was asked by Webster Fire Chief Craig Akins to continue to assist with C. P. R. and to apply the leads from the Automated External Defibrillator to the female. Off. Burns utilized the Webster Police Department issued A. E. D. and moments later the female had a pulse and blood pressure.

Due to the prompt response, assessment and immediate initiation of treatment, Off. Burns was able to perform a rescue that saved the female's life. The critical minutes in which Off. Burns arrived and took action to get oxygenated blood flowing to the female's vital organs most certainly contributed to her life being saved. The female's family and the medical community estimates that under the circumstances this female was found, death or long term disability, may have occurred within as little as three to five minutes.

I commend Off. Burns actions in saving a life. I am hereby honored to award **Officer Michael Burns** the prestigious *Life Saving Award* for his meritorious achievement which was performed in an exemplary manner and in keeping with the highest expectations of conduct and performance.

On July 9, 2013, Off. Mark Reed was conducting an investigation in the 400 block of Krieger Road. As he was leaving the area, Off. Reed noticed a motorcycle down with a male victim near the 200 block of Krieger Road. As Sgt. Jason Thomas, Off. Shane Konrad and Off. Scott Smith arrived on scene, Off. Reed stated that the male victim had puncture wounds to his chest and that he may have been stabbed. Sgt. Thomas and Off. Reed tried to obtain information from the victim as to what had happened but the victim stated that it was not easy to speak as he was having difficulty to breathe.

As medical personnel arrive, Sgt. Thomas checked the area and noticed blood drops on Krieger Road that appeared to be from the male victim who was heading northbound when he crashed his motorcycle. Off. Konrad and Off. Smith secured the area where the motorcycle went down as people were beginning to congregate and the area needed to be preserved. Off. Reed advised that earlier he was taking a statement from a victim in another crime when he noticed that there was a party taking place near 414 Krieger Road and that there were two motorcycles parked on the sidewalk, and that he heard one leave just before he left the area.

Sgt. Thomas, Off. Konrad, Off. Reed and Off. Scott went to 414 Krieger Road where they noticed drops of blood on the pavement. Sgt. Thomas noticed that there was a large amount of blood on the sidewalk in front and that the blood trail ran along the sidewalk beside 413 towards the 600 block. The officers followed the blood trail and noticed that it appeared that the assault occurred in the grass area directly behind 413.

Off. Konrad, Off. Reed and Off. Smith began to knock on doors and question individuals in the area while trying to locate the tenant of 414. After speaking with an individual, the officers were led to the 600 block of Krieger Road where there were possible witnesses and participants to the assault. Once at the location, two witnesses were located as well as an older white male that was the actual tenant. While the witnesses were being questioned separately by Off. Reed and Off. Smith, Off. Konrad realized that the older white male that was there was a possible suspect. Off. Konrad immediately went to the older white male where he told Off. Konrad that he had stabbed the victim.

The suspect provided a statement detailing the incident and was arrested for Assault 1st. Through excellent observations, investigative skills and teamwork, the actual crime scene was located and the suspect was apprehended even with the lack of information from the victim and the fact that the victim was found a distance from where the incident took place.

I am pleased to present **Officer Scott Smith** with this *Chief's Letter of Commendation* for meritorious achievement and service to the department, performed in an exemplary manner and in keeping with the highest expectations of conduct and performance.

Criminal Investigative Section

The Criminal Investigative Section of the Webster Police Department is responsible for the investigation of complex and time consuming crimes that are committed within the Town of Webster.

Currently, Investigator Troy Williams and Investigator Gretchen O’Dea are assigned to this unit. These Investigators assist the Patrol Division with following up investigations or cases that they generate themselves. The case load ranges from burglaries, sexual assaults, robberies, larcenies forgeries, and homicides.

The investigative unit also conducts background investigations on prospective employees, obtain statements from victims and witnesses, lecture in the local high schools about criminal justice related topics and will utilize a Computer Voice Stress Analyzer for truth verification. The investigative unit is also used extensively to prepare and execute search warrants. Investigator O’Dea is the Sex Offender Coordinator and is responsible for maintaining updated information regarding all sex offenders living within the Town of Webster.

The Criminal Investigative Section of the Webster Police department works hand in hand with other area law enforcement agencies. Investigators network with State, Federal, County and other local law enforcement to identify crime and criminal trends. A side from other law enforcement agencies, the Investigators also work with financial institutions, local businesses, school and corporations. Investigators also liaison with the Monroe County District attorneys Office

Highlights from 2013

Residential Burglary

Officers responded to an apartment dwelling for a reported burglary. Victim returned home to find his apartment’s door kicked in and his musical equipments stolen, valued at over \$1,500.00. It was later determined that a suspect responded to area pawn shops, attempting to sell the stolen property. After a lengthy investigation, Investigator Williams was able to arrest a suspect and assist in the prosecution, in county court.

Assault / Stabbing

Officers responded to an apartment at Phillips Village for the report of a stabbing. Investigators were summoned, and responded to the scene. The victim was stabbed several times, and transported to the hospital. Through the investigation it was determined that an argument involving two men led to a physical fight and then a stabbing. The suspect was arrested and Investigators assisted the district attorney’s office with the prosecution.



Criminal Investigative Section

Highlights Continued-

Grand Larceny

An officer responded for a theft of rare coins, at an apartment complex. The case was turned over to the criminal investigations unit. Investigator Williams was assigned to the case and through the investigation was able to make an arrest on a suspect, known by the victim.

Cell Phone Store Burglary

Officers responded to Verizon Store for the burglary of several cell phones valued at over \$7,000.00. Investigator O'Dea was assigned the case and worked with other county police agencies whom, experienced the same type of burglaries. During the course of this extensive investigation, a suspect was located, arrested, and prosecuted.

Rape

Officers responded to Catholic Charities Group Home for the rape report. Investigator O'Dea was assigned the case, and began the investigation. With assistance of the district attorney's office, and the group home, a suspect was arrested.

Residential Burglaries

Officers responded to three residences between April 25th and May 1st, for reported burglaries. Several other police agencies had been experiencing similar burglaries. Investigator Williams with the assistance of Brighton PD Investigators and the district attorney's office, was able to get clearances on all three burglaries and restitution for victims, after the arrest of a suspect.

Grand Larceny/CPFI 2nd

Webster Central School Officials contacted WPD in regards to an employee withdrawing monies from school accounts and stealing money. After an extensive investigation and interviewing of the suspect, WPD Investigators arrested the suspect, and assisted with her prosecution by the district attorney's office.

Assault / Stabbing

Officers responded to the Phillips Village Apartment Complex. Investigators responded and took over the investigation. The alleged suspect, victim and numerous witnesses were interviewed, during the course of this investigation. The investigation led O'Dea and Williams to arrest the alleged victim for Assault and additional charges. The alleged suspect, was found to be defending himself from a stabbing attack. Prosecution was successful.



Criminal Investigative Section

Highlights Continued-

Robbery

Officers responded for the robbery report at the NOCO Gas Station, in the village. Investigator O'Dea was issued the case to investigate. During the investigation it was determined that the suspect was wanted for an additional robbery in the southern tier. The suspect was identified and later located, in the City of Rochester, and taken into custody. The suspect did admit to both robberies, and was arrested.

Assault / Stabbing

Officers responded for a domestic assault / stabbing. Investigators were requested to the scene and took over the investigation. During the investigation, the victim refused to assist with the investigation. While interviewing parties involved, Investigator O'Dea was able to receive a confession from the suspect, reporting defense of another family member. The suspect was arrested and arraigned.

Residential Burglary

Officers responded for the burglary reported by homeowner. No suspects listed, but family believed their drug addicted son had been involved in the crime. After a couple of months, police located the drug-addicted son, involved in another crime in Webster. Investigator Williams interviewed the suspect on the crimes, and suspect admitted to all, including the burglary to his parent's home two months earlier. The suspect was arrested.

Grand Larceny / Stolen Vehicle

Officers responded to Bridal Lane, Thaxted Circle, and Little Bardfield development for larcenies out of vehicles, and a stolen vehicle that occurred the next day. Investigator Williams was assigned the cases and followed up with leads. A suspect was taken into custody and interviewed with the help of Irondequoit PD. The suspect was charged and arrested by Investigator Williams with four felony charges.

In addition to these major investigations, the two investigators continuously follow up on the following investigations: 1995 Kelly Gaffield Undetermined Death Investigation, and the 2003 Xerox Federal Credit Union Murder / Bank Robbery Investigation.





Webster Police Department Calls for Service by Year




Preliminary Semiannual Uniform Crime Report, January-June, 2013

Preliminary figures indicate that, as a whole, law enforcement agencies throughout the nation reported an increase of 1.9 percent in the number of violent crimes brought to their attention for the first 6 months of 2012 when compared with figures reported for the same time in 2011. The violent crime category includes murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. The number of property crimes in the United States from January to June of 2012 increased 1.5 percent when compared with data from the same time period in 2011. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. Arson is also a property crime, but data for arson are not included in property crime totals. Figures for 2012 indicate that arson increased 3.2 percent when compared to 2011 figures from the same time period.










Parking Tickets



Webster Police Department Parking Citations Issued by Year









Webster Police Department Citations Issued by year






Animal Control 2013 the Year in Review

This year we were kept very busy with dogs running loose. We seized more than 60 dogs for running at large and returned several others back to the owners when we confirmed that they were licensed. New York State Law states that any dog that is not licensed or not displaying a current and valid license tag must be seized and secured in a kennel until a valid license is produced by the owner. That being said, it more than pays to keep your dog licensed. Between seizure fees boarding fees and licensing you could be looking at close to a \$100.00 charge to reclaim your dog after it has been seized by the Town.

The Animal Control Unit has been spending a lot of time in the parks watching for dog owners that do not observe the Town Code that pertains to dogs. When you are in any park in the Town of Webster, you must have your dog on a leash and you must pick up any waste deposited by your pet. That also means that you must take it home and dispose of it in an acceptable manor. It amazes me to see people that will pick up their dog feces and put it in a plastic bag and throw it into the woods, or leave it in the parking lot on the pavement! Besides being very disrespectful to everyone else in the area, that is littering and if you are caught you will be ticketed and face fines in excess of \$150.00 dollars per violation. Please be considerate and pick it up and dispose of it properly.

2013 also brought our 8th Animal Control Officers Training class to fruition and we had a record breaking 70+ attendees! This year's class was very well received and critiqued by its attendees. Special thanks needs to go to Barbara Acomb-Hollands and Patricia Famiglietti for their assistance in the planning and execution of the two-day seminar. Special thanks also goes to local merchants that assisted us in proving food and lodging for all attendee's: Proietti's, Dunkin Doughnuts, Hegedorn's and DiBella's Sub's all helped provide food and the Super 8 Motel helped out with the lodging. Thanks again to all who helped and attended. We had ACO's from about 15 counties across New York State that attended.

Instructors from The Town of Webster Police Department as well as the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, New York State DEC, Agriculture and Markets, Bob Minchella, Dog Behaviorist and our own Deputy Town Attorney, Raja Sekharan were on hand to explain the proper enforcement of Town and State laws including dangerous dog laws.

Without the support of the Town Supervisor, Town Board and Webster Police Department, as well as the West Webster Fire District for providing the training facility, this program would not be possible.

As you can see it has been a busy year. We hope you all take the time to take good care of your pets, get your dogs licensed and have a great happy and healthy summer season!



Webster Police 2013 Year in Review

2013 was greatly a rebuilding year for the Webster Police Department. On the heels of the 2012 Christmas Eve tragedy, there was an exodus of sorts for members of the Webster Police Department. We saw both anticipated and unanticipated retirements of senior members of our agency.


Long time senior investigator Charles Sciortino retired after the first of the year having planned to do so. We then saw the unexpected retirements of our most senior patrolman Joseph Schirmer and the most senior Sergeant Thomas Emery in addition to senior Sergeant Kevin Hall as well.

Not only was the department reeling from the loss of Administrative Bureau Commander, Lieutenant Michael Chiapperini, who led the Criminal Investigative Unit, Records Division, Training Division and Recruitment/Hiring Division, but also the impact of a loss of senior command, investigative and patrol expertise.

The year 2011 economic down turn necessitated downsizing in departmental staffing levels from an authorized level of 33 to 28 sworn officers. The Christmas Eve tragedy and subsequent retirements suddenly found our sworn staffing levels reduced to 23 sworn officers serving the 44,000 residents of the Town and Village of Webster. The critically low police department staffing levels caused difficulty in continuing the established shift coverage levels for our road patrol.

Town Supervisor, Ron Nesbitt, along with the Town Board realized that fast action was in order and quickly took appropriate measures. Those measures included addressing urgent shortages while being cognizant of future departmental needs. Supervisor Nesbitt negotiated a memorandum of understanding with the Webster Police Union which paved the way for an unprecedented hiring of five recruit officers to attend the police academy which started in October, 2013. The board additionally authorized the immediate hiring of four lateral police officer candidates in order to more quickly have trained boots on the ground in order to provide service to the community. In effect, close to one third of the department staffing being new employees as we enter 2014.

Remaining senior officers were pressed into service doing background investigations on potential lateral and new hire candidates which burned through numerous man hours to complete, but necessary to find the very best police officers for our town. Background investigations, medical and psychological examinations, physical agility testing, civil service requirements; the list was lengthy trying to find candidates that measured up to Webster's rigorous hiring standards.

In the end, we were able to find five excellent police officer recruits that were able to attend the 2013 police academy representing the Webster Police Department. Those police recruits will hit the streets in March of this year to first perform field training with seasoned veterans prior to patrolling on their own in July.

Three of the four approved lateral police candidates, Officer Dominique Pietrantonio (formerly Brockport PD Officer), Officer Scott Smith (formerly Yates Co Sheriff Deputy), and Officer Michael Wilder (formerly East Rochester PD Officer) hit the streets on their own at the end of June and first part of July. Lateral Officer Christian Portalatin (formerly Binghamton PD Officer) was hired in December and will finish field training at the end of January, 2014.

Interviews and assessments were also conducted to fill vacant investigative and command positions required because of the tragedy and retirements. Sgt. Dennis Kohlmeier was promoted to Lieutenant, Officer Shaun Welch, Officer Tony Galante, and Officer Shane Konrad were promoted to the rank of Sergeant and Officer Troy Williams was promoted to Investigator.

With all of the internal changes it is important to note that crime did not take a holiday in town and the department was kept extremely busy with regular calls for service in addition to criminal investigations.

Statistics

Webster Police responded to 28,878 calls for service in 2013 which reflects a 3% decrease in overall calls from 2012. These calls ran the gamut from serious felony gang assaults, violent domestic complaints, home and business burglaries, drug related robberies to motor vehicle accidents, suicides and natural death investigations.

Reported Crime

The good news was that crime took a slight dip in the town for the year. Webster officers investigated 492 of the more serious Part 1 index crimes, which reflected a 1% reduction from 2012. The less serious, Part 2 index crimes also decreased 16%.

We experienced 9% reduction in reported domestic violence related crimes from 162 reported in 2012 to 148 reported in 2013. This reduction is significant after a 42% increase in domestic crimes in 2012. While there is no clear indicator for the 2012 rise, some experts pointed to family relationship stressors which may be related to joblessness and other economic difficulties leading to domestic violence events.

Crime Clearance Rates

I am pleased to report Webster Police clearance rates for reported crimes continue to far exceed national averages. Webster officers were able to clear 36% of Part 1 crimes. The national average for clearance on Part 1 crimes is only 20%. Webster officers also cleared 59.4% of reported Part 2 crimes. The national average for clearing Part 2 crimes runs at only 28%.

Traffic Enforcement

The road patrol continues to focus on highway safety and issued over 1,237 tickets for traffic violations. Our road patrol officers actively enforce aggressive driving violations in an attempt to reduce the overall number of motor vehicle accidents. Webster police officer made 2902 vehicle and traffic stops in 2013 in attempts to educate drivers and curb aggressive and dangerous driving behavior. Our goal with aggressive traffic enforcement is simply to make our roadways safer for all that use them which includes bicyclists and pedestrians. Thankfully, we again experienced no fatal motor vehicle accidents this past year.

While the year 2013 started out sadly for Webster PD members, with the help of a most supportive community and elected officials, the Webster Police Department made great strides in working through personal tragedy while meeting the necessary restructuring goals necessitated by a great loss of senior command staff and officers. All accomplished while never losing sight of the need to provide the very best in public safety response service.

The Webster Police Department thanks you for allowing us to be your number one line of defense for the ever vibrant and growing community of Webster. We are honored to continue the tradition of over 86 years of providing outstanding safety and security to the citizens and business owners of the Town and Village of Webster.

We believe our public service oriented service is second to none and hope we continue to earn your trust and respect. Thank you, once again, for allowing the Webster Police Department to serve you.
