FOREWARD

Webster Police Department 2010 Year in Review

It is indeed my continued pleasure to bring you Webster Police Department's highlights of the past year. As your Chief of Police, I am honored to lead Webster's Finest as we strive to make Webster the finest town in New York State. It is with your support that we are able to effectively police our town. Our relentless goal is to make every person feel safe and protected while enjoying our unique freedoms as citizens of the United States of America.

As police officers, we swear to uphold the laws of the State of New York and the Constitution of the United States. It is an oath that each one of us takes very seriously. Professional policing sets a very high standard in which to conduct ourselves as we wear the uniform. It is my distinct honor to report Webster Police Department's 2010 Year in Review.

The Statistics

Webster Police responded to 30,088 calls for service in 2010 which reflects a 2% decrease in overall calls from 2009. These calls ran the gamut from violent domestic complaints, home and business burglaries, drug related robberies to motor vehicle accidents, suicides and natural death investigations.

Reported Crime

Webster officers investigated 549 of the more serious Part 1 index crimes, which reflected a 10% reduction from 2009. The less serious, Part 2 index crimes increased 22.6%. More significantly, the Webster community saw an increase in overall crime for the first time in four years with total index crimes rising from 1236 in 2009 to 1320 in 2010. The crime increase can partly be attributed to a spike in home and residential burglaries during the calendar year.


The commercial and residential growth in the community has continued to place greater demands on the services we provide and cause additional challenges for the men and women of the Webster Police Department.

Crime Clearance Rates

Webster officers were able to clear 30% of Part 1 crimes. The national average for clearance on Part 1 crimes is only 20%. Webster officers cleared 59% of reported Part 2 crimes. The national average for clearing Part 2 crimes runs is only 28%. The Webster Police clearance rates for reported crimes continue to far exceed national averages.

Traffic Enforcement

The road patrol continues to focus on highway safety and issued 3,069 tickets to violators plying our local highways. Our road patrol officers actively enforce aggressive driving violations in an attempt to reduce the overall number of motor vehicle accidents. Our goal with aggressive traffic enforcement is simply to make our roadways safer for all that use them which includes bicyclists and pedestrians. Thankfully, we experienced no fatal motor vehicle accidents this past year.

Goals and Objectives Set and Met

Increase Driving While Intoxicated / Driving while Impaired Enforcement

The police department set out to achieve a 25% increase in our DWI / DWAI enforcement efforts over 2009 arrest statistics. In fact, our 2010 arrests were increased 258% with a total of 111 arrests made verses the 31 arrests made in 2009.

Reduction of Motor Vehicle Accidents

Officers were charged with attempting to reduce motor vehicle accidents by 5% over 2009 statistics in the three Select Traffic Enforcement (STEP) identified corridors, i.e.: Bay Road, Five Mile Line Road, and South Ave., by aggressive enforcement both by routine patrols and STEP funded enforcement efforts directed to those three select areas. Success was easily met with a 47% total reduction of accidents in those defined areas.

Updated Web Site

We joined with all other Town Departments by providing department members to work together in a consolidated group to create a new and updated town wide website. The new website was rolled out at years end. The final product, while still a work in progress, is a very professionally product which we are quite proud of. The police department portion offers crime mapping features allowing our residents the ability to see what is going on in their specific neighborhoods.

Electronic Requests

The new website also allows for our business owners to submit electronically to the police department with updated emergency contact information for after hours contact by the police. We also provide citizens the ability to provide requests for property checks for those times in which they may be away from their homes and want special attention provided by the police.

Personnel Updates

Officer Mark Reed, who joined us in November 2009, successfully completed the lateral transfer field training program and was assigned to the Operations Bureau, Patrol Division, 1st Platoon working the hours 11 PM through 7 AM. I applaud Officer Reed on his tremendous work ethic and would note that he has led our department in DWI arrests since his arrival which has undoubtedly led to safer highways in our Town.

Krista Konieczny joined the Webster Police Department civilian staff on May 5th, 2010. Krista came to us as in internal Town of Webster transfer previously assigned to the Town Clerk's office. Krista assumed the position of receptionist at the police department greeting citizens at the front window and directing incoming phone calls. I welcome Krista to our police department.

In 2010, Richard Gallatin received a permanent appointment as Coordinator of Police Staff Services after successful passing the New York State Civil Service Examination held for the position. Gallatin's has worked diligently on

upgrading the records division and as the department liaison with Monroe County as they develop a new records management system.

Lieutenant Sal Simonetti, a 21 year veteran of the police department, retired in July 2010 to accept the Chief of Police position at SUNY Geneseo. All will miss Lt. Simonetti and we wish him the best in his next assignment.

Monica Weingartner retired from the Records Division on December 17th after having served the Town of Webster for over 30 years. Monica's friendly and conscientious focus on service will be missed by all. Congratulations to Monica on an outstanding career!

Promotions

Effective Monday, August 9, 2010, Sgt. Michael Chiapperini was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant; he was assigned to the Administrative Bureau reporting directly to the Chief of Police for duties and assignments. Lieutenant Chiapperini, an 18 year veteran of the department, hit the ground running and brings a great deal of enthusiasm to his new assignment. I welcome Lieutenant Chiapperini to my command team and confident Mike will be a tremendous success in his new assignment as Bureau Commander.

Effective Monday, August 9, 2010, Off. Jason Thomas was promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Sergeant Thomas, an 8 year veteran of the Webster force, was assigned to the 1st Platoon (2300-0700) as relief sergeant and will report to Lt. Rieger for duties and assignments. I welcome Sergeant Thomas as our newest first line supervisor where I am confident in his abilities to continue his success as he leads his platoon by example.

On Monday, March 8, 2010, Deborah Licata was promoted from the entry level Police Data Entry Clerk IV to an advanced Police Records Clerk III title. Deb first joined the police department part time in March 2002. In June 2008, Licata had an opportunity to take a full time entry clerk position. Deb worked diligently to learn and successfully master the many different aspects of the records division and as such became eligible for promotion. As part of her job promotion, she immediately assumed new duties and responsibilities and continued to report directly to the Coordinator of Police Staff Services. I applaud Deb for her outstanding work in her division and wish her continued success.

Grants

The police department continues to rely heavily on state and federal grants in order to allow us to deliver the highest level of service to the Webster Community.

In 2010 the Webster Police Department continued to participate in the following grant initiatives; Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (S.T.E.P), Buckle Up New York (B.U.N.Y.), Child Passenger Seats (C.P.S.) grant and Stop DWI programs. All of these grant funded programs aim to make the roads of New York and Webster safer for all. The Webster Police Department has had great success with all of these initiatives and looks forward to helping to make the roads safer for everyone.

In 2010 the department had great success with the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (S.T.E.P). The S.T.E.P. program resulted in significant reduction of accidents and allowed officers to 347 citations for aggressive driving related offenses.

The police department continues to educate and enforce seatbelt laws through the Buckle Up New York program (B.U.N.Y.). The police department through its seatbelt surveys has shown local seatbelt compliance to be at 94%.

In 2010 the Webster Police Community Services Section again provided the Child Passenger Safety Seat program to the Community. By appointment, Webster Police Officers inspected and properly installed child safety seats. The Community Services Section also conducted several Safety Seat inspection events where residents can bring their vehicles in without appointments to have their safety seats inspected. All of the inspections are free of charge.

Once again the Webster Police Department participated in the New York Stop DWI program utilizing both stationary checkpoints and roving patrols to identify drivers who were operating their vehicles while intoxicated. In 2010, 111 arrests were made in Webster for DWI related offenses.

In late 2010 the Webster Police Department filed application for an Operation Impact grant. This grant will help fight crime in targeted locations within the Town and Village of Webster. This grant will purchase new equipment to assist police in identifying individuals committing crimes in our community.

The Webster Police Department continues to adapt technologically to meet the needs of the fastest expanding Town in Monroe County. We train and educate our police officers to be the finest anywhere in New York State. We diligently work to provide the best policing services available to our citizens without becoming an unbearable tax burden.

Goals and Objectives

The Webster Police Department met the following goals and objectives for calendar year 2010:

1.) Goal: Achieve 25% increase in DWI/DWAI enforcement over 2009 statistics by increased utilization of DWI checkpoints, which have been proven to be more effective than the use of individual DWI patrols and reduce reliance of SDWI funded / related court time expenditures to free up funds for enforcement. Note: 31 total arrests made in 2009.

Results: Increased DWI arrests by 258%.

2.) Goal: Reduce motor vehicle accidents by 5% over 2009 statistics* in the three Select Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) identified corridors, (Bay Rd, Five Mile Line Rd and South Ave), by aggressive enforcement by routine patrols and STEP funded enforcement efforts directed to those three select areas. **Result: Reduced motor vehicle accidents in STEP corridors by 47% total.** See chart:

3.) Goal: Establish working group to consolidate Police Department website with the Town of Webster web site and the Parks and Recreation web site. **Results: Working Web Site Group established / Web Site created and migrated.**

4.) Goal: Update business directory and create electronic version which is accessible by officers in patrol vehicles. **Results: Business file directory electronically created in Excel Spread sheet and available to officers on the network.**

Goals and Objectives

The Webster Police Department has set the following goals and objectives for calendar year 2011:

- 1.) Develop and implement a user searchable electronic database of all issued departmental orders.
- 2.) Continue participation and compliance with the NYS Accreditation Program.
- 3.) Promote highway safety:
 - A. Increase cell phone distracted driving enforcement efforts by 25% by use of roving patrols and stationary checkpoints.
 - B. Insure departmental fleet vehicles are equipped with hands free cell phone devices.
- 4.) Acquire covert electronic surveillance monitoring equipment in an effort to more efficiently Deploy personnel to decrease crime in identified and targeted areas.
- 5.) Continue to work closely with Monroe County in the development and implementation of safer and more efficient mobile data and equipment in patrol vehicles.
- 6.) Increase public awareness of crime trends and law enforcement initiatives including enforcement and education by means of increased press releases, Web updates and crime mapping services.
- 7.) Monitor public expectations, perceptions and satisfaction of the Webster Police Department by means of random surveys.



2010 Commendations

The Webster Police Department recognizes the importance of honoring those officers who go above and beyond the call of duty in order to advance the mission of the Webster Police Department and ensure the safety of all citizens of the Town.





COMMENDATIONS

Officer David Herrle,

On Wednesday, April 7, 2010, Officer David Herrle responded to a report of a missing suicidal 51-year old female. Off. Herrle interviewed the complainant who was the mother of the missing woman. The complainant revealed that her daughter had a debilitating medical condition, had been very depressed as of late, and had made calls to a family member in Texas indicating that she was going to end her life.

Off. Herrle responded to the missing woman's home and spoke with her husband to obtain more information. Off. Herrle requested that contact be made to the woman's cell phone company in an effort to electronically track her location through her cellular phone. Off. Herrle also requested that the victim's husband check with credit card companies to determine if any of her credit cards had recent usage. The credit cards showed recent activity at a liquor store in Wolcott, New York, and the cell phone company advised of the closest cell tower near the last location of the woman's cell phone. The Wayne County Sheriff's Office was contacted and requested to check an area that the woman used to frequent as a child.

The Wayne County Sheriff's Office contacted the Webster Police Department to advise that the missing woman had been located in her vehicle unconscious but breathing. It was apparent that she had overdosed on medications and cut her wrists with a razor blade in a suicide attempt. She was transported for emergency medical treatment and did survive the suicide attempt.

On Wednesday, April 14, 2010, the missing woman's mother came to personally thank Off. Herrle for his actions. She relayed that the doctors advised that had her daughter had been located an hour later, she would not have survived the suicide attempt.

I commend Off. Herrle's actions and his follow through in this case that resulted in ultimately saving a life. I am hereby honored to award **Officer David Herrle** the prestigious *Commendation Award* for his meritorious achievement which was performed in an exemplary manner and in keeping with the highest expectations of conduct and performance.



COMMENDATIONS

Lieutenant Michael Chiapperini,

In February, 2010, the Office of the Chief of Police was informed that due to then Sergeant Michael Chiapperini's self initiated investigative work and diligence, a long-time predator was removed from the streets of Monroe County.

On August 23, 2009, the Monroe County Sheriff's Office received a report of an armed robbery that just occurred at a location on Empire Boulevard, Penfield. The suspect was reported to be wearing latex gloves. Sgt. Chiapperini heard the report and assisted in the investigation; eventually finding a pair of latex gloves in the middle of Bay Road in Webster. The gloves were taken into evidence and the Monroe County Public Safety lab examined them and found DNA material. The material found was linked to a known offender in the County.

Using this piece of evidence and information along with other leads, it was then possible for the suspect to be placed under surveillance. The suspect was eventually apprehended, interviewed, and eventually admitted to thirteen armed robberies in two adjacent counties.

Investigator Gretchen O'Dea,

On June 10, 2010, a business within the Village of Webster was burglarized. In the middle of the night, the suspects smashed out a glass window in the front door and proceeded to remove several thousands of dollars in computer equipment before fleeing the scene. This burglary matched the circumstances of several other burglaries committed throughout Monroe County and was assigned to Investigator Gretchen O'Dea for follow-up investigation.

Inv. O'Dea immediately made contact with the other agencies involved and began to coordinate all available information. A suspect was identified and picked up for an interview. Inv. O'Dea, along with other agencies, spoke with this individual at length and eventually gained a confession along with information on some of the other suspects involved.

During this investigation Inv. O'Dea participated in several stake-outs; changing and flexing her personal plans to participate in the covert surveillance details regarding this case. The suspects did victimize a business under surveillance and were subsequently taken into custody without incident.

The weeks of investigation, collaboration and coordination with area agencies, in addition to Inv. O'Dea's personal fortitude and professional dedication, resulted in the clearance in a number of area burglaries, along with the arrest and removal of several career felons from our community.

On April 14, 2010, the Webster Police Department was dispatched to a Krieger Road address for a report of a male that was struck in the head with a handgun. Officer Shane Konrad and Officer Brian McCoy were the first on the scene and initiated a comprehensive investigation into the assault. Officers soon learned that a second victim reported being assaulted by the same suspect. Off. Konrad and Off. McCoy coordinated the investigation while then Officer Jason Thomas and Officer Shaun Welch combed the area for the suspect who had fled the scene on foot.

The investigation led officers to both the suspect's home and the home of his ex-girlfriend. Interviews and information obtained indicated that the suspect was still in the area. Sergeant Dennis Kohlmeier spotted the suspect walking through his backyard toward his residence. Officers took the suspect into custody without further incident but did not recover the handgun.

The Monroe County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit was summoned to assist in search of the handgun. The nitrate trained K-9 located the handgun in the backyard of the suspect's home beneath some trees. A check of the handgun revealed that it was reported stolen to the Webster Police in 2006. The suspect was arraigned on multiple misdemeanor and felony charges.

On November 23, 2010, Officer Shaun Welch received a call from a night clerk of an area business about two suspicious males that had just left the store. The clerk supplied the name of one of the males. Off. Welch recognized the name of the individual as previously convicted known burglar. Upon arriving in the area, Off. Welch noticed two males sitting on a bench in front of a local business and recognized one of the males as the individual in question. Off. Welch interviewed the males and with no information to further detain them, asked them to leave the property of the closed premise.

As the males started to walk away, Off. Welch observed a crowbar lying on the ground beneath the bench. Sergeant Jason Thomas, Officer Shane Konrad and Office Mark Reed responded to assist Off. Welch as he pursued the suspects. Pursuant to the investigation, it was determined that the two males used the crowbar to force entry into another business in town where they vandalized vending machines and stole cash.

Off. Reed confirmed that a burglary took place and obtained a deposition from the victim. It was also determined that one of the suspects had also entered a private motor home and removed a television from inside. The coordinated efforts of these officers resulted in both suspects being charged with Burglary 3rd and Criminal Mischief 3rd.



COMMENDATIONS

Lieutenant Joseph Rieger,

On January 26, 2010, Lieutenant Joseph Rieger was on routine patrol when he heard a radio broadcast regarding residential burglaries that had just occurred in the towns of Brighton and Penfield. The broadcast supplied a description of the suspect vehicle occupied by a least one male. This information matched the description of a vehicle believed to be involved in previous burglaries in the area, including one in Webster. The vehicle was last observed heading north; possibly towards the Town of Webster.

Lt. Rieger proceeded to check the areas of Plank Road and Creek Street as possible locations that the suspect vehicle may be heading towards. As he entered the area, Lt. Rieger observed a vehicle parked in the area which matched the description given. The vehicle was occupied and when they observed Lt. Rieger's patrol vehicle, they attempted to leave the area. Calling for assistance, Lt. Rieger initiated pursuit, effected a vehicle stop, and with assistance, took the occupants into custody.

Monroe County Sheriff's Office investigators gleaned a confession from one of the suspects that not only closed a Town of Webster residential burglary, but also numerous burglaries that had been reported that day in the towns of Brighton and Penfield. Lt. Rieger's astute observation skills and investigative prowess resulted in the apprehension of these burglary suspects.



Operations Bureau

The backbone of any police department is the patrol division. The Webster Police Department Patrol Division falls under the Operations Bureau

The road patrol is staffed with 18 officers, 6 sergeants and is commanded by Lieutenant Joseph Rieger. The patrol division provides dedicated police services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

Webster Police Officers provide services in the Town not only with cars, but many Officers have specialized training which allows them to utilize snowmobiles and bicycles during their patrol duties. Webster Police Officers continue to walk the "beat"; daily Webster Officers walk the Village Business District. This added patrol technique is a great way for our officers to get out and talk with merchants, residents and those visiting our Village.

Although the Patrol Division is considered the backbone of our department, there are several specialized units that support its function and mission. The Evidence Technician Unit provides evidence gathering and analysis services for crimes that have occurred in the Town. The Special Crash Investigation Unit provides for specialized and highly technical surveying and computer skills that are necessary to reconstruct serious crashes and crime scenes.

The Officers assigned to the patrol division respond to 911 calls for service, as well as self initiated activity. 911 calls for service can include routine medical calls, domestic disputes, larcenies, vehicle crashes and lockouts. Self initiated activity can include vehicle and traffic stops, D.W.I. arrests, and officers checking on suspicious persons or situations.

Some cases of interest that your Road Patrol handled in 2010

Making False Written Statement

(Jan) (*Benjamin J. Hann*) a resident of Ridge Road in Webster, called 911 to report he was robbed at gunpoint in the Wegman's parking lot. After a joint investigation with Road Patrol and Criminal Investigation Section, Hann admitted that his claim of being robbed at gunpoint while in the Wegman's parking lot was fabricated. He was arrested for Making False Written Instrument.

Att. Burglary/Crim. Mischief

A Ridge Road resident reported he was home at around 1p.m. when an unknown black male kicked in the rear door to his residence. The victim confronted the male and told him to get out. The male exited the home, ran down the driveway got into a vehicle and left the scene.

Burglary/Petit Larceny

(June) At approximately 0320 hours, patrols responded to an East Main Street residence for the burglary alarm activation. Upon arrival, they found the alarm sounding and the side door forced open. While checking the lower interior of the home, the unknown suspect kicked out an upper level screen and jumped onto the roof below. The suspect jumped onto a second (lower) rooftop and then onto the ground, fleeing through neighboring yards. K-9 attempted to track the suspect with negative results. Suspect took several pieces of jewelry.

Criminal Possession of Stolen Property

(June) Patrols were dispatched to Joanne Fabrics on Holt Road. Upon arrival it was learned that the suspect, from Illinois, had been spooked by an employee and did not exit the store with the cart full of merchandise which the suspect had placed by the exit to the parking lot. After questioning the suspect, patrol officers observed four large bags of craft items in the suspect's vehicle. The suspect did admit to stealing the items from Jo-Ann Fabrics and Michael's stores in Greece. It was eventually discovered that over \$10,000 worth of property had been taken

Petit Larceny/Criminal Mischief (great teamwork)

(July) Patrols responded to the report of the theft of four Blue Rhino propane tanks that had just occurred at K-Mart on Ridge Road. The suspects had fled in a vehicle. The vehicle was observed by our Animal Control Officer on Route 104 and the Irondequoit Police were notified. The suspects stopped in the median on Route 104 near Portland and fled on foot but were quickly apprehended by Police. *Roberto V. Ramirez* of Ridgeway Avenue, Rochester, and *Harry Garcia* of Alexander Street, Rochester, were arrested. Propane tanks were a hot item to steal in 2010 and several stores thorough the County experienced larcenies of these tanks. After this arrest these thefts ceased.

Making Graffiti

(September) After a lengthy investigation into acts of graffiti in the Village of Webster, Sgt Adriaansen, Officer Burns, and Officer Herrle did an outstanding job identifying and arresting five local teens for making graffiti.

Identity Theft

Webster Police fielded several call for service relating to identity theft. Multiple victims from Webster as well as neighboring towns and counties have reported the theft of their identities resulting in the removal of funds from their bank accounts. Although this was a national problem, the Webster Police were happy to provide assistance to Town residents

Burglary/Criminal Mischief

(November) A Bay Road home was victim of a burglary. At approximately 1040 p.m. the resident heard someone force open the locked storm door at the rear of her home. The suspect(s) then entered the kitchen area through the unlocked main door. The victim's son and family dog scared the suspect(s) and chased an unknown white male suspect out of the home.

ADMINISTRATION BUREAU

Once again the Administration Bureau experienced a change at the helm in late 2010 as it did in 2009. This most recent change came about with the retirement of Lt. Sal Simonetti, who left the Webster Police Department to assume command of SUNY Geneseo Police Department as Chief.

On August 9, 2011 Sergeant Mike Chiapperini was promoted to Lieutenant and assumed command of the Administration Bureau. The Administration Bureau contains several subsections which provide support for department operations in a variety of ways. These include:

- Central Investigation Section
- Community Services Section
- Records Section
- Property Control / Quartermaster Section
- Training Section

The Administration Bureau is also responsible for overseeing the New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. This program requires continual monitoring and updating of the 132 standards that cover a variety of topics in administration, training, and operations.

Less than 20% of police departments across New York State have received this honor

Maintaining compliance with these standards ensures the department follows best practices established by the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services. The program provides for a clear mandate on how policies and procedures are developed, promulgated and practiced in the field. An accredited agency gives assurance to the public that their police department is among the best of the best. It also provides for potential reductions in liability insurance costs which help save taxpayer money.

CENTRAL INVESTIGATION SECTION

The Webster Police Department's Criminal Investigation Section (CIS) is primarily responsible for the investigation of serious crimes committed in the Town of Webster. Many of these incidents begin at the patrol level and are referred to CIS due to their complex nature. These cases range from burglaries, serious larcenies and robberies to sex crimes, assaults and homicides.

CIS Investigators are also tasked with conducting background investigations on prospective employees, lecturing at local high schools regarding criminal justice related topics, preparing and executing search warrants, and obtaining statements from suspects, victims and witnesses with the incidental use of the Computer Voice Stress Analyzer for truth verification. This section also maintains and updates information on all sex offenders living within the Town and Village of Webster.

Investigators Charles Sciortino and Gretchen O'Dea are currently assigned to the Central Investigation Section. They work closely with federal, state, and county law enforcement agencies as well as local businesses, financial institutions, schools and corporations in an effort to share information and resources; they also liaison with the Monroe County Crime Analysis Center and District Attorney's Office on a regular basis. Some of the more serious cases Webster Investigators were involved in include:

January:

Officers responded to a house party at a residence on Ice Pond Way where a 15 year old female was reporting that she was raped by an 18 year old male who was at the party. The victim reported that she was in a basement bedroom with a

friend and the suspect when the suspect started sexually abusing her. The victim stated that the friend walked out and the suspect then forcibly raped her. Investigator Sciortino interviewed several of the people who were present at the party as well as the suspect who ultimately confessed to having sex with the victim. This case was closed with an arrest charging the suspect with Rape in the First Degree.

April:

Investigator Sciortino, working in conjunction with the BIVONA Child Advocacy Center in Rochester, investigated the sexual assault of two boys that occurred in Webster in 2008. Investigator Sciortino interviewed an 8 year old and an 11 year old boy who had just disclosed to their mother that a male, who she was dating while they lived in Webster, had sexually abused the two boys for several months. The boys were interviewed as was the suspect. The suspect denied all allegations, but was facing similar charges in another jurisdiction. The suspect was indicted by a Grand Jury on two counts of Predatory Sexual Assault. This case was closed with the arrest of the suspect.

May:

Officers received a report that an employee of Johnston RV Country had stolen a cash deposit worth \$7435 by taking the deposit and falsifying a vehicle purchase agreement to reflect different numbers in the company's computer system. With the assistance of the owner of the company, Investigator O'Dea started looking into prior sales deals that the employee was involved with at the company. It was determined that the employee had stolen money from the company during at least three other sales deals. Investigator O'Dea obtained information from the suspect during interviews that incriminated him in these incidents. This case was closed when the suspect was arrested on twelve felony charges and one misdemeanor charge.

June:

Officers responded for a burglary that had occurred at Jeff's Computer Service where multiple suspects had broken out the glass front door, entered the store, and stolen approximately \$6,000 worth of laptop computers. Investigator O'Dea coordinated the Webster investigation with Investigators throughout the county who had similar cases. This investigation also incorporated a burglary of a computer store located in West Seneca. The investigators developed one suspect who was involved in the burglary ring. That suspect was arrested and used as an informant. The investigators set up a surveillance detail using the informant to track the burglars. The investigation culminated at a store on East Ridge Road in Rochester where a team of six burglars were taken into custody while breaking into a cellular telephone store.

November:

Officers responded for the report of an assault victim who was at the Red Robin Restaurant on Holt Road. Initial responding officers located an 18 year old female victim who stated that earlier she had gotten a ride home from a friend's house in Irondequoit by an acquaintance of hers. The acquaintance had asked if she wanted to see his new apartment. She accompanied him to the apartment where he forcibly sexually assaulted her. Investigator Sciortino coordinated the investigation and interviewed the victim. Ultimately, the suspect was arrested for Rape in the First Degree and is currently serving time in New York State Prison for the crime.

December:

Officers were dispatched to a gun point robbery that had just occurred in which two Hispanic males had robbed and pistol whipped a victim at a residence on Webster Road. The males fled the scene with a computer and video game system. The suspect vehicle was located westbound on Route 104 where officers pursued the vehicle over the Bay Bridge westbound as the suspects threw proceeds from the robbery as well as the handgun used in the robbery over the side of the Bay Bridge into the Irondequoit Bay. The suspects led the police on a chase that went through multiple jurisdictions and ended in the Town of Irondequoit where the suspects fled the location on foot. One suspect was apprehended at the scene, but the other was not immediately caught. Investigator O'Dea coordinated interviews of the victims and the suspect in custody and was

able to obtain the identity of the outstanding suspect. Investigator O'Dea collaborated with other local agencies in attempting to bring the second suspect in to be arrested. After tracking down many leads as to the whereabouts of the second suspect, Investigator O'Dea developed information that the male was staying at a location on Driving Park Avenue in Rochester. The residence was staked out and the second suspect was taken into custody after another chase through the city. Both suspects were charged with Robbery in the First Degree, Assault in the Second Degree, and Grand Larceny in the 4th Degree. The case is still going through the court proceedings.

In addition to these major investigations, CIS continues to field leads on both the suspicious death of Kelly Gaffield and the robbery/murder that occurred at the Xerox Federal Credit union in the hopes of bringing both cases to successful conclusions.

Community Service Section Updates:

CRIME PREVENTION SERVICES

Neighborhood Watch – Two (Candlewick, Applegrove,) new neighborhood watch programs were initiated in 2010, growing the program to twenty-eight neighborhood watches. Webster Police support neighborhood watch through crime prevention efforts and numerous requests for assistance with quality of life issues (speeding, loud music, parties etc.) Community Services routinely shares crime prevention information and crime occurrences with its watch captains. Neighborhood Watch participants often reach out to Community Services for assistance.

Personal Home Security Inspections - Requests for home security inspections remain steady. After a personal inspection of a residence, homeowners are given a written recommendation offering advice on how to improve their residence security. Burglary prevention information is consistently included with Community Services crime prevention presentations. Burglary prevention education is provided at community service functions, Neighborhood Watch, and to individual individuals.

SAFETY SERVICES

Child Safety Seat Inspections - In 2010 (fiscal year), Community Services conducted approximately 120 car seat checks during our fitting station (daily operation) and facilitated two car seat check events which consisted of another 47 seat checks. A majority of seats were not properly installed and needed adjustments. The Police Department plans on holding Car Seat check events in June & July. Safety checks are conducted throughout the year by appointment.

School Safety Patrol - The Community Service Officer helps school officials supervise the school safety patrol. Supplies, events etc. are coordinated for all elementary schools. The Community Services officer spoke to the Plank North safety patrol.

S.M.A.R.T. – As usual there was a high demand for its display on residential neighborhoods. The trailer was also used to monitor traffic flow and speeds. Requests are documented on SMART Trailer Request forms. Some of the areas the SMART Trailer was utilized are Gravel Rd, East Main Street, McEwen Dr, Deerhurst Lane, Holt Rd, Hard Rd, Frawley Dr, Kittleberger Dr, Herman Rd, Maple Dr. etc).

Child ID/Fingerprint Program - Approximately 150 ID kits with photographs were distributed in 2010 at various events in Webster. Residents commonly call the Community Services Section requesting Child ID's. Child ID's were available at all community service events, including Community Arts Day, & the West Webster Fire Department open house.

ENFORCEMENT SERVICES

Bicycle Patrol - Conducted numerous hours of patrol in the village, parks, subdivisions, festivals, and bike trails. Officers

Deb Hart and Pete Scorsone are certified as bike patrol officers. Officer Hart patrolled numerous hours throughout the town during the months of July and August.

Snowmobile Patrol - With the adoption of new local snowmobile laws, Webster officers were busy addressing nuisance complaints regarding citizen snowmobile use. The Webster Police Department, along with the Webster Ridge Runners snowmobile club, conducted two youth snowmobile classes certifying youths between the ages of 10 to 17 to operate a snowmobile safely and legally.

Special Attentions - Community Services and road patrol officers conducted hundreds of special attentions throughout residential and commercial areas. CSS continued coordinated numerous speeding special attentions and provided radar enforcement in neighborhoods where speeding was reported. CSU participated in speed enforcement throughout various problematic areas in the town and village.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS - AWARENESS SERVICES

Citizen Police Academy – Twenty five participants attended the fall academy. All graduates viewed a variety of law enforcement presentations.

Senior Citizen Police Academy – Eighteen participants graduated from the 11th annual Senior Citizen Police Academy in 2010.

Student Police Academy Camp - The Webster Police Department facilitated the 7th Student Police Camp in July, 2010. Twelve students participated this past year in the Camp and enjoyed demonstrations in topics such as Criminal Investigations/Truth Detection, Hazardous Device (Bomb) Disposal Squad, DWI/ Traffic Enforcement, Fire Investigations, “Shoot Don’t Shoot” training, S.W.A.T., Crime Scene Investigations/Evidence Collection and more.

Making a Difference Award -The “Making a Difference” award continues to thrive. A total of six schools participate in the monthly and yearly segments. Six students were selected from Webster High Schools who were honored at the Webster Police 1000 Club Annual Awards Dinner on March 4, 2010. The Webster Health & Education Network (WHEN) provided provided funds for T-shirts for all monthly selected students. The Making a Difference committee consists of Schroeder Principal Joe Pustulka, Willink School Psychologist Sandy Herman, and CSO Pete Scorsone.

Webster Business Registry Program- Initiated in the fall of 2003 this program is a huge undertaking where the Community Policing Officer is constantly updating all Webster business contact information. Officer Hart meets with business owner’s completing an updated contact form for after hour contacts and gives the business owner a decal for their business indicating that they are a registered business with the Webster Police Department. At the suggestion of the road patrol, CPO has initiated transforming the business registry electronically, so that it is available in all road patrol vehicles. You can also update your business contact forms by using our website.

Mentor Program- This program assists Webster High School seniors with class projects related to the Criminal Justice Field. Students meet with their assigned Officer / Mentor and interact with officers as required to complete their program needs. Two high school students completed their mentorship with Webster Police in the spring of

Webster Police Department Tours – The Community Services Section hosted many tours of the Police Department in 2010 consisting of Boy scouts, Girl Scout troops, and school children. Most tours are scheduled for Saturdays to maximize the Community Services availability and alleviate the road patrol of this function.

Education

Presentations - The Community Services Section coordinated numerous crime prevention and safety awareness presentations to youth and adults in our community throughout the past year. These presentations cover many topics, including, but not limited to: home security, personal Safety, DWI prevention, fraud and con awareness, child abduction awareness, Seniors Security,

Drug Awareness, Babysitter Orientation, Home Alone, Meet a Police Officer, Driver Education, Tobacco/Alcohol Awareness, Observation & Inference, and more. In the spring of 2010, Community Services Officers presented a “sexting” presentation to all health classes in Willink and Spry Middle Schools. The program was first developed at the end of 2009.

DARE - The DARE classes continue to receive favorable reviews from parents, teachers and students. In 2010, Officer Hart & Officer Scorsona delivered the Dare Program to Seven public and private elementary schools consisting of twenty-five classrooms and approximately 625 fifth and sixth grade students. The DARE Vehicle, donated by the Kiwanis Club of Webster, appeared in numerous community events and is available upon request. In addition to the core curriculum, (4) fourth grade lessons, are provided to St. Rita’s students along with numerous drug prevention lessons to 1st and 2nd graders at the public schools.

Law Enforcement Explorer Post:

In 2010, the Webster Police Explorer Post continued under the direction of Officer Deb Hart. The post participated in their annual spaghetti dinner benefit held at the Masonic Temple to raise money for various charities and to fund various post expenses.. The Explorer Post also assisted with a food drive for the Scouting for Food and worked to recruit additional members for their post at the Community Arts Day at Webster Schroeder High School. The Post is currently comprised of 15 dedicated youths interested in learning about law enforcement careers.

F.A.I.R. (Fundamentals of Alcohol Intoxication Recognition) In 2010 Community Services, in conjunction with Monroe County STOP DWI and the Monroe County Sheriff’s Office, developed an intoxication recognition program to be instructed for alcohol servers. The program will be certified by New York State Liquor Authority in 2011 with funds provided by Monroe County STOP-DWI. CSC will become the program administrator for other agencies interested in Monroe County.

Simulated DWI Crashes: None conducted in 2010.

Student Intern Program –Approved students earn college credit for participating in and observing all facets of the Webster Police Department. The program exposes the interns to a total overview of the department’s operations, while preparing them for a possible career in law enforcement. One student completed an internship in 2010.

Open House Open house will be conducted in 2011.

Records Section

The Webster Police Department Record Section again experienced a year of personnel gains and loses. In January Fran Szenkowitz retired from the department. Fran served as a clerk in the records section and was vital in the daily processing of department criminal and arrest records. Debbie Licata took over and quickly adapted to her new duties. In May Krista Konieczny joined the records section as the receptionist for the department. Krista joined the department after serving as the Town of Webster receptionist. Lastly in December Monica Weingartner retired. We welcome Krista and congratulate Fran and Monica in their retirement. The Records section continued to process over 3,100 new reports and over 3000 case follow up reports and maintained 0.76% data entry error rate to the New York Department of Criminal Justice.








“Preliminary figures indicate that, as a whole, law enforcement agencies throughout the Nation reported a decrease of 6.2 percent in the number of violent crimes brought to their attention for the first 6 months of 2010 when compared with figures reported for the same time in 2009. The violent crime category includes murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. The number of property crimes in the United States from January to June of 2010 decreased 2.8 percent when compared with data from the same time period in 2009. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. Arson is also a property crime, but data for arson are not included in property crime totals. Figures for 2010 indicate that arson decreased 14.6 percent when compared to 2009 figures from the same time period.”




ADULT ARREST GRAPH











Webster Police Department Citations Issued by year









by Offense Category**





2010 Year in review Webster Animal Control

Well another busy year has come and gone with several changes in the way New York State handles animal control laws. Dog licensing is now the responsibility of individual Town Clerks. The State of New York will no longer be keeping track or logging dogs at the state level. However this does not mean you do not need to license your dogs. It is still a requirement of New York State Law to license your dog at the age of Four (4) Months. Each township will license and maintain a log of all licensed dogs in a town. This does mean that I will no longer be able to find any dog bearing a New York State license tag and cross reference the tag to return it to the owner. To eliminate this problem the new Town of Webster tags has an I.D. number as well as the Phone number for the town clerks office which can be called during business hours to find the owner and return the dog home. Recently we published an article in the Webster Herald that talked about the handling of wildlife found on your property here are some reminders that you should observe in dealing with wildlife.

If You Care, Leave it There

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Monday reminded New Yorkers to keep their distance and not to disturb newborn fawns or other young wildlife as many animals are in the peak season for giving birth or hatching young.

Finding a fawn deer lying by itself is fairly common. Many people assume that young wildlife found alone are abandoned, helpless and need assistance for their survival. In nearly all cases this is a mistake, and typically human interaction does more damage than good. If you see a fawn or other newborn wildlife, enjoy your encounter, but for the sake of their well being, it is important to keep it brief and maintain some distance, the DEC stated in a press release.

Young wildlife quickly ventures into the world on shaky legs or fragile wings. While most are learning survival from one or both parents, some normally receive little or no parental care. Often, wild animal parents stay away from their young when people are near. For all of these young animals, the perils of survival are a natural part of life in the wild. Some will not survive. However, young wildlife that learns these important survival skills are the most fit and usually live the longest.

White-tailed deer fawns present a good example of how human intervention with young wildlife can be problematic. Most fawns are born during late May and early June. For example, Tom Link, Webster's animal control officer, was called Wednesday, May 18 to a fawn found on the shoulder of Shoemaker Road between Hard and Whiting roads. Link told the Herald he took the fawn from the arms of a woman who was holding it and "put it back in the woods near the creek so the doe could find it. The fawns bleat for their mothers, it sounds kind of like a sheep," Link said. The doe's are always nearby so they can keep an eye on their fawns, he continued. While fawns are able to walk shortly after birth, they spend most of their first several days lying still. During this period a fawn is also usually left alone by its mother except when nursing. People do occasionally find a lone fawn and mistakenly assume it has been orphaned or abandoned, which is very rare. In such a case, fawns should not be picked up. In fact, if human presence is detected by the doe, the doe will delay its next visit to nurse.

Human scent can also put the fawn at risk by attracting predators to the site. Webster has a prevalence of coyotes which will attack newborn wildlife such as fawns, said Link. A fawn's best chance to survive lies in being raised by its mother. Fawns nurse three to four times a day, usually for less than 30 minutes at a time, but otherwise the doe keeps her distance. This helps reduce the chances that she will attract a predator to the fawn. The fawn's protective coloration, near lack of scent and ability to remain motionless all help it avoid detection by predators and people. "It is best today to leave a fawn alone unless you know for a fact that the mother has been killed by a car," said Link. "We try not to interfere with nature.



